A regular meeting of the Borough Council of the Borough of Rumson was held in the Charles S. Callman Courtroom of Borough Hall on August 11, 2015 at 7:30 p.m.

The Mayor declared a quorum present and announced that the notice requirements of the Open Public Meetings Act had been met by the posting and mailing of a schedule of all regular and work meetings of the Borough Council for the year 2015 to the *Asbury Park Press* and the *Two River Times*.

On motion by Councilman Rubin, seconded by Councilman Hemphill, the minutes of the previous meeting were approved as written, copies having been forwarded to all Council members. All in favor.

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**LETTER FROM THE STATE OF NEW JERSEY MITIGATION UNIT OF THE EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT SECTION ADVISING THAT FEMA HAS APPROVED THE BOROUGH'S PROPOSED SCOPE OF WORK AND BUDGET MODIFICATIONS FOR THE PUMP STATION GENERATORS TO INCLUDE SCADA TYPE ALARM SYSTEMS AT THE ELEVEN BOROUGH PUMP STATIONS:**

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The Municipal Clerk/Administrator advised of a letter dated July 29, 2015 from the State of New Jersey Mitigation Unit of the Emergency Management Section reporting that FEMA has approved the Rumson Borough Scope of Work and Budget Modifications – Pump Station Generators to include SCADA Type Alarm Systems at the eleven Borough pump stations and awarded a grant in the amount of \$310,560.00.

**LETTER FROM THE BOARD OF CHOSEN FREEHOLDERS ADVISING OF A PRELIMINARY LIST OF ROADS TO BE RESURFACED AS PART OF THE MONMOUTH COUNTY 2015 ROAD RESURFACING PROGRAM AND THAT HARDING AND RIDGE ROADS WOULD BE REPAVED FROM OAKLAWN ROAD IN FAIR HAVEN TO THE CORNER OF BINGHAM AVENUE IN RUMSON:**

Arnone, Monmouth County Freeholder, advising of the preliminary list of roads to be repaved as part of the Monmouth County 2015 Resurfacing Program. It was noted that Freeholder Arnone's letter included a preliminary list of the roads to be resurfaced and Harding and Ridge Roads are scheduled to be resurfaced from Oaklawn Road in Fair Haven to the corner of Bingham Avenue in Rumson.

**NEWS RELEASE FROM MONMOUTH COUNTY ADVISING OF THE UPCOMING REPAIR WORK ON THE OCEANIC BRIDGE BEGINNING AUGUST 11<sup>TH</sup> THAT SHOULD BE COMPLETED IN FOUR (4) DAYS; THE BRIDGE WILL REMAIN OPEN, BUT TRAFFIC WILL BE SHIFTED TO NARROW LANES TO ALLOW CONCRETE TRUCKS TO DELIVER SMALL LOADS TO BE POURED INTO THE PIERS BELOW:**

The Municipal Clerk/Administrator advised of a Monmouth County news release dated August 5, 2015 advising of the work scheduled on the Oceanic Bridge to begin on August 11<sup>th</sup> that will last for four (4) days, weather permitting; the work will require the shifting of motor vehicle traffic to narrow lanes from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. to allow concrete trucks access to deliver small loads to be poured into the piers below. The news release reported that the County had received a \$600,000 grant from the North Jersey Transportation Planning Authority Board of Trustees in January to perform a Concept Development Study for the replacement or rehabilitation of the Oceanic Bridge; Monmouth County plans to replace the Oceanic Bridge in the next ten (10) years.

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**INTRODUCTION OF BOND ORDINANCE 15-011 TO AMEND A BOND ORDINANCE FINALLY ADOPTED FEBRUARY 26, 2013 FOR VARIOUS IMPROVEMENTS IN FIRST READING. PUBLIC HEARING SCHEDULED FOR TUESDAY, AUGUST 25, 2015 AT 7:30 P.M.:**

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The Municipal Clerk/Administrator advised that Bond Ordinance 15-011 was made necessary due to the FEMA Grant in the amount of \$310,560.00 that the Borough received for the sewer alarm, as noted in the communication from the State of New Jersey earlier in the meeting.

The Municipal Clerk/Administrator read the following ordinance by title only in first reading:

**15-011**

BOND ORDINANCE FURTHER AMENDING A BOND ORDINANCE FINALLY ADOPTED FEBRUARY 26, 2013 BY THE BOROUGH OF RUMSON, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, IN ORDER TO PROVIDE FOR CHANGES THEREIN

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF RUMSON, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY (not less than two-thirds of all the members thereof affirmatively concurring), AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The bond ordinance of the Borough of Rumson, in the County of Monmouth, New Jersey (the "Borough"), finally adopted February 26, 2013 and entitled, "BOND ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING \$1,500,000 AND AUTHORIZING \$1,425,000 BONDS OR NOTES OF THE BOROUGH FOR VARIOUS IMPROVEMENTS OR PURPOSES AUTHORIZED TO BE UNDERTAKEN BY THE BOROUGH OF RUMSON, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, NEW JERSEY" (the "Original Ordinance"), as amended by the bond ordinance of the Borough, finally adopted April 14, 2015 and entitled, "BOND ORDINANCE AMENDING A BOND ORDINANCE FINALLY ADOPTED FEBRUARY 26, 2013 BY THE BOROUGH OF RUMSON, IN THE COUNTY OF MONMOUTH, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, IN ORDER TO PROVIDE FOR CHANGES THEREIN" (the "Amendment" and together with Original Ordinance, the "Amended Ordinance") is hereby amended as follows:

(i) all references in the Amended Ordinance to the appropriation of "\$2,005,000" are hereby deleted and "\$2,255,000" is substituted in lieu thereof.

(ii) all references in the Amended Ordinance to the authorized principal amount of the bonds of "\$1,587,005" are hereby deleted and "\$1,825,100" is substituted in lieu thereof.

(iii) Section 1 of the Amended Ordinance is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

“Section 1. The several improvements described in Section 3 of this bond ordinance are hereby respectively authorized as general improvements to be made or acquired by the Borough of Rumson, New Jersey (the “Borough”). For the said improvements or purposes stated in said Section 3, there is hereby appropriated the respective sums of money therein stated as the appropriation heretofore made thereof and amounting in the aggregate to \$2,255,000 including the (a) aggregate sum of \$86,905 as the several down payments for said improvements or purposes required by law and more particularly described in said Section 3 and now available therefor by virtue of provision in one or more previously adopted budgets of the Borough for down payment or for capital improvement purposes and (b) aggregate sum of \$653,557.17 from insurance and other sources.”

(iv) The provisions of the chart contained in Section 3 of the Amended Ordinance related to the first Improvement or Purpose are hereby amended to read in their entirety as follows:

“Sanitary Sewer Repairs including but not limited to those as a result of Hurricane Sandy	\$1,330,000	\$744,440	40 years”
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(v) Section 4(b) of the Original Ordinance is hereby amended to read in its entirety as follows:

“(d) The average period of usefulness of said purposes, within the limitations of the Local Bond Law and taking into consideration the respective amounts of said obligations authorized for the several purposes, according to the reasonable life thereof computed from the date of the said bonds authorized by this bond ordinance, is 25.73 years.”

Section 2. All other details of the Amended Ordinance shall remain the same.

Councilman Rubin moved the adoption of this ordinance in first reading. Motion seconded by Councilman Day and carried on the following roll call vote:

## RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Borough of Rumson entered into an Interlocal Agreement with the Borough of Little Silver to provide Uniform Construction Code Services to Little Silver with an Agreement authorized by Resolution 2015-0428-64 adopted April 28, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the Borough of Rumson has agreed to serve as the Interlocal Enforcing Agency pursuant to N.J.A.C. 5:23-4.6 et seq. and said services shall include that of the Construction Code Official and of the Building, Electrical, Fire and Plumbing Subcodes; and

WHEREAS, N.J.A.C. 5:23-4.6 requires that any agreement for Uniform Construction Code Services be a four-year (4-year) agreement; and

WHEREAS, the original Agreement and Resolution 2015-0428-64 adopted by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Rumson was for a period of three and one half (3½) years;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Rumson that the original Agreement entered into between the Borough of Rumson and the Borough of Little Silver for Uniform Construction Code Services be amended to a term of four (4) years beginning July 1, 2015 through June 30, 2019; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a certified copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Chief Financial Officer and the Borough of Little Silver.

### **RESOLUTION 2015-0811-112 AUTHORIZING THE TERMINATION OF EMPLOYEE DAMIEN F. BRENNAN EFFECTIVE AUGUST 12, 2015:**

The Municipal Clerk/Administrator advised that the discussion of the personnel matter would normally be handled in closed session, however the attorney for Mr. Brennan, Mr. Ziegelheim, had telephone today to advise that Mr. Brennan would attend the meeting and requested any discussion be handled at the public meeting this evening. The Municipal Clerk/Administrator noted that Mr. Brennan was present and Mr. Brennan acknowledged that his request for it to be discussed in the public meeting was correct.

The Municipal Clerk/Administrator reviewed the incident in which Mr. Brennan had been involved on September 20, 2014 and read the Conclusions of Law of Judge Bette E. Uhrmacher's Court decision:

1. The Borough of Rumson has sustained its charges against Sgt. Damien Brennan that he violated the Rules and Regulations of the Borough and N.J.S.A. 40A-147.
2. The Borough has sustained its charges that Brennan committed Misconduct.
3. The Borough has sustained its charges that Brennan violated the laws of the State of New Jersey.
4. The Borough has sustained its charges that Brennan committed conduct unbecoming a Public Employee.
5. The Borough has sustained its charges that Brennan failed to abide by all the rules, regulations and department procedures and directive governing police officer employees.
6. The Borough has sustained its charges that Brennan failed to conduct himself in accordance with high ethical standards, on and off duty.
7. The Borough has sustained its charges that by pleading guilty to reckless driving, by losing his driver's license for a two month's period, and by failing to appear at his extra-duty assignment without consent, Sgt. Brennan violated Article IV of the Department's Rules and Regulations.
8. The policy of Progressive Discipline applies to law enforcement officers.
9. Sgt. Brennan's only prior disciplinary history involves a reprimand received for conduct in March of 2011. Nonetheless, he has a prior disciplinary action.

10. The *Thurber* case relied upon by Brennan, is inapposite in the situation of a law enforcement officer. In *Thurber*, the Appellate Division found that the decision of the ALJ to issue a suspension rather than a termination for egregious conduct of a municipal court administrator, caused by a panic attack, was not arbitrary, capricious or unreasonable. However, a law enforcement officer is held to a higher standard of conduct than a regular public employee such as Ms. Thurber. His conduct is measured, *inter alia*, by the *Moorestown/Phillips* standard.
11. Significantly the Court in *Moorestown*, held that a police officer must “present an image of personal integrity and dependability in order to have the respect of the public, **particularly in a small community**” (emphasis added). In *Phillips*, the Court stated that “by drinking and driving and thus impairing his ability to uphold the law,” even an off-duty officer’s conduct evidenced a failure to “exercise the good judgment required of a police officer.”
12. Sgt. Brennan violated the *Moorestown/Phillips* standard by his conduct.
13. As a supervisory officer, Sgt. Brennan is held to a higher standard when disciplinary action is taken against him. *In re Bradley, supra*.
14. Pursuant to the *Moorestown/Phillips* standards, I conclude that the decision of Chief Paterson to terminate Damien Brennan’s employment, is neither arbitrary, capricious, nor unreasonable.
15. There is insufficient evidence presented to the Hearing Officer, from which to find that Brennan’s actions at the police department and at the hospital were likely caused by an attack of Meniere’s disease.
16. Even assuming *arguendo*, that Brennan was having an attack at the Red Bank police station and at the hospital, it did not cause him to go to the Dublin House and drink alcohol, instead of going to his extra-duty assignment. It did not cause him to drive a car in a careless manner, after drinking. Nor did it cause the collision with the dumpster or the plea of guilty to reckless driving and loss of license.
17. In making this decision the Hearing Officer notes that this is a very sympathetic case. Prior to September 20, 2014, Damien Brennan was the personification of the American dream. He was liked and respected by his colleagues and supervisors. It also is clear that the decision to terminate will have a devastating impact on Brennan and his family. Nonetheless, Brennan’s very public actions embarrassed the Department, violated its rules and regulations and the law of this State, and constituted misconduct justifying termination.

## CONCLUSION

THEREFORE, it is the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of August, 2015, concluded, for the reasons expressed in this Decision, that the decision to terminate Damien Brennan from the Rumson Police Department, is sustained.

Mayor Ekdahl asked if Mr. Brennan would like to make a statement at this time.

Mr. Brennan stated that this was one of the hardest things he has had to do, but he thought that he needed to come before the Council and speak. He advised that he came from Ireland 18 years ago to find the “American Dream” and worked extremely hard to get where he was until September last year. He stated that in his 38 years he has made good decisions, but unfortunately had made some bad decisions with the occurrence of the incident last year that brings us here today. He stated that he felt that, given the opportunity, he could and would succeed as a police officer if given the chance, as he had done in the past. He stated that he wanted to appear this evening to be seen as a good police officer whose error in judgment would never be repeated. He stated that he had attended in-patient rehab at Princeton House followed by 12 weeks of intensive care in an out-patient program, as well as regular visits with his therapist and regular AA meetings. Mr. Brennan thanked his wife for her support in the 17 years they have been together—13 years married. He stated that he was not drinking now and would stay sober with the help and support of his family.

Mr. Brennan stated that he believed he had been born to be a police officer to help people as he has successfully done in his years with the Borough of Rumson. He stated that he had given so much to the Rumson Police Department and felt that he had a lot more to give and asked the Mayor and Council for a second chance. He said that he was now a stronger person who has learned so much from his experiences since September. He asked that he be disciplined, but that his wife and children not be punished and their dreams taken away by his termination.

Mr. Brennan apologized to the Mayor and Council for having put them through this ordeal and thanked for letting him speak.

Mayor Ekdahl thanked Mr. Brennan.

WHEREAS, after all the evidence was presented, testimony heard and documents and briefs reviewed, the Hearing Officer rendered a decision in writing on August 3, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the August 3, 2015 written decision of the Hearing Officer finds that Damien F. Brennan should be terminated from employment; and

WHEREAS, it is the obligation and duty of the Mayor and Council to review the Hearing Officer's decision in this matter; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council have had an ample opportunity to read and review the Hearing Officer's written decision dated August 3, 2015;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Governing Body of the Borough of Rumson, New Jersey that it accepts the Hearing Officer's written decision dated August 3, 2015 and directs the Borough Administrator to immediately terminate Damien F. Brennan from employment effective August 12, 2015; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be forwarded to the Chief Financial Officer, Police Chief and Deputy Municipal Clerk.
